Executive Summary

2014 was a highly productive year for NBSPRN.

60 projects were started in 2014 that primarily contributed to enhancing collaboration, supporting grant applications and participating in working groups/committees. NBSPRN was/ is engaged in 11 projects with combined funding of more than \$1,100,000.

The organization enhanced its outreach activities through more networking events and an increased focus on community organizations. The outreach coordinator has been making progress in engaging the membership to give the network a better understanding of the opportunities that exist for funding, collaboration and knowledge mobilization, to support evidence-based decision-making.

The organization continued to carve out its role as a knowledge broker, authoring knowledge mobilization plans for grant research proposals and beginning development on a policy research database to help get existing research into the hands of knowledge users.

With the position of Research Coordinator established in May, NBSPRN supported 12 funding applications valued at more than \$5,600,000. In an effort to develop new revenue streams that sustain the network, the organization began offering a fee-for-service on successful applications. This model ties the success of the organization with that of its members.

In November, NBSPRN hosted its largest event to date, generating media interest, nearly \$60,000 in revenue, and a sold out audience, welcoming Deputy Premier Stephen Horsman; former White House Deputy Chief Technology Officer and TED Talk alumni Dr. Beth Noveck; Internet Privacy expert Dr. Michael Geist; and Deloitte Global Public Sector Director and author of the <u>Solution Revolution</u>, Paul MacMillan.

An increase in media coverage, website traffic, and social media activity is indicative of the network's growing profile. With this profile comes increased awareness of the network's activities and demands for its services. Already in 2015, 18 new projects have been started with more expected to begin shortly as funding decisions are announced in the coming month.

2014 has set the stage for success in the coming years, as our stakeholders become increasingly aware of our value proposition, our activities crystallize and we pursue opportunities under the banners of government renewal, smart government, open government and open data.

Newsletter, Web & Social

Newsletter performance 2014

The newsletter continues to be a valued source of information for our members. The table below shows the performance averages for each sector compared to NBSPRN's performance. While we are above the industry average, we have observed a decline in newsletter usage.

Website usage continues to climb as more and more content is being generated and more traffic is being driven from social media channels. We have observed significant increases in traffic over previous years, with substantial traffic from social media channels over the same period in 2013.
